LEGISLATURE RETURNS TO UNFINISHED BUSINESS WITH MAPS AND BUDGET

The Kansas Legislature returned to Topeka after a short break after Turnaround. Lawmakers took Monday off before working all week. In addition to the numerous bills and concurrent resolutions that are being heard and worked under the dome, lawmakers still need to introduce a redistricting plan for the state's Legislative districts. There has been no word yet on when those maps will be released.

Further, lawmakers need to pass the state's budget. This annual task, which is constitutionally the only item that needs to be addressed before the Legislature adjourns for the Session, is particularly interesting this year because of a surplus of both state tax receipts and federal stimulus funds. Some lawmakers are looking to pay down state liabilities, put money away into a rainy-day fund, or enact tax credits or exemptions. Others would like to continue to rebuild the economy after COVID-19 devastated many businesses, industries, and services.

We expect many of these issues to develop as March progresses. Further, we expect many of these items will impact how Leadership proceeds in working any number of other major issues that have not yet been resolved.

SENATE PASSES BILL FILLED WITH TAX EXEMPTIONS, CREDITS, PROPERTY TAX FREEZE

The Kansas Senate debated a small income tax credit <u>bill</u> on Thursday that quickly ballooned to include a freeze on property taxes, income tax credits for schoolteachers and tax credits for housing developments. Specifically, the measure now includes the following amended provisions:

- A \$250 individual income tax credit for schoolteachers purchasing classroom supplies.
- A property tax freeze for seniors 65 and older or disabled veterans whose total household income does not exceed \$50,000.
- An increase the exemption provisions from the 20 mill property tax levy. The current 20 mill rate applies to all property after the first \$20,000 in value, the amendment would increase the amount to \$65,000 and add a calculation for a scale to increase the exemption based on statewide property values.

A provision was also proposed by Senate Minority Leader Dinah Sykes (D-Lenexa) to provide a \$250 income tax rebate to all Kansans who have filed a tax return. The amendment, which was identical to a key tenant of Governor Laura Kelly's proposed budget and her 2022 reelection campaign, was hotly debated but was ultimately defeated by a vote of $\frac{16 \text{ to } 18}{18}$.

A final vote on the bill will be taken on Monday.

In addition to taking final votes on bills debated Thursday, the Senate will debate the following bills under the heading of General Orders, listed below:

The Senate is also expected to vote on the appointment of Janet Stanek, who was nominated by Governor Kelly to be the new Secretary for the Department of Health and Environment. Stanek takes over for Dr. Lee Norman, who left the agency in November of 2021.

SUPREME COURT JUSTICE SELECTION REFORMS CONSIDERED

The <u>Senate Judiciary Committee</u> heard two measures on Friday that would modify how state supreme court justices are chosen.

<u>SCR 1621</u> would create the opportunity for a constitutional amendment to be placed on the ballot which would permit the Governor to appoint a supreme court justice when there is a vacancy. The resolution would also eliminate the <u>Kansas Supreme Court Nominating Commission</u> – a body made up of nine members that are both lawyers and non-lawyers that fills vacant positions through a merit-based nomination, review, and vetting process. Once nominees have been reviewed, the commission narrows the pool to three names and then the Governor chooses one nominee to appoint.

Another <u>measure</u> discussed Friday would also eliminate the nominating commission, but allow for partisan, statewide election of justices.

Many Republicans in the state have longed for such reform. In recent years, the Kansas supreme court has upended major Republican-supported school finance legislation and pro-life measures, which has prompted calls to change the current process.

No word yet on if or when the Resolutions will be worked.

FAIRNESS IN WOMEN'S SPORTS ACT TO BE HEARD

The Fairness in Women's Sports Act has been scheduled to be heard. <u>SB 484</u> will have a hearing on Monday, March 7 at 1:30 PM in the <u>Senate Education Committee</u>.

The concept may sound <u>familiar</u> as it passed the Legislature in 2021 but was vetoed by the Governor. The bill would require sports sponsored by a K-12 or post-secondary public school be expressly designated based on biological sex. Athletic teams or sports designated for females would be prohibited from being open to students of the male sex. Similar measures have been floated across the country. The Kansas Board of Regents have <u>noted</u> that enactment of the bill could have an effect on the state's ability to host NCAA events if their policies conflicted with the bill.

PENSION LIABILITY PAYDOWN BILLS CONTINUE THROUGH SYSTEM

A bill that would pay down the state's employee pension liability has moved across the dome and will now have a hearing on the House side. <u>SB 421</u> would transfer over \$250 million to the Kansas Public Employees System (KPERS) Trust Fund to make up for payments that were missed in 2017 and 2019 when the state was in a more parlous financial situation. Proponents noted that if the state takes advantage of the robust revenues it has now and pays down the liability, it could save nearly \$200 million in interest and annual payments.

The bill passed the Senate 40-0 earlier this year.

A similar <u>bill</u> passed out of the House Insurance & Pensions Committee that would not only make the \$250 million payment for the missed years, but would also apply an additional \$746.1 million towards generally unfunded actuarial liability.

SB 421 will be heard Monday, March 7 in the <u>House Insurance & Pensions Committee</u>.

MAJOR TAX REFORM BILLS ON DOCKET FOR NEXT WEEK

A number of bills pertaining to tax refunds and credits on homesteads will be heard next week in the <u>Senate Tax Committee</u>. After years of rising property valuations and, more recently, a historically competitive real estate market, measures like the ones being heard next week have been discussed by the Legislature for quite some time. Bills that will be heard on Tuesday, March 8 include the following:

- <u>SB 540</u> Expanding the selective assistance for effective senior relief (SAFESR) income tax credit for certain residential property taxes paid.
- <u>SB 462</u> Providing a homestead property tax refund to certain persons based on the increase in property tax over the base year property tax amount.
- <u>SB 384</u> Providing an income tax credit for certain qualified property taxes levied on homesteads.

The Committee will also be taking up two resolutions. <u>SCR 1619</u> would urge the adoption of <u>recommendations</u> made by the 2021 Special Committee on Taxation and <u>SCR 1620</u> would have a measure put on the ballot that would ask for a constitutional amendment to be considered that would require a supermajority of the legislature any time the state wanted new or increased taxes. Both resolutions will be heard on Thursday, March 10.
