SHORT WEEK TO START THE SECOND HALF OF THE LEGISLATIVE SESSION

After taking a short break following "Turnaround," the Legislature returned to Topeka on Wednesday. While the week's agenda was relatively light, significant action is anticipated throughout the month of March, including work on the state's budget. As a reminder, lawmakers have until March 24 to consider bills before being on the floor the week of March 27. Please be sure to check the weekly schedule at the bottom of this report to stay apprised on anticipated committee work.

LIQUOR BILLS DEBATED AND PASSED IN HOUSE

Several liquor bills went across the House floor this week, with one more to be heard next Friday. The following bills cleared the House on Thursday and will now head to the Senate for consideration (all bills were introduced in an exempt committee, allowing them to be worked on past the Turnaround deadline):

• <u>HB 2058</u> – HB 2058 would amend provisions of the Kansas Liquor Control Act to require **remittance of gallonage taxes** by holders of a special order shipping license to be submitted to the Secretary of Revenue monthly rather than quarterly as required in current law.

In the <u>House Federal & State Affairs Committee</u> hearing on the bill, proponent testimony was provided by representatives from the Wine & Spirits Wholesalers Association and the Kansas Department of Revenue, Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC). The proponents indicated

that the bill would allow the ABC to match reports to identify unlawful shipments of alcohol liquor. They indicated currently, common carriers and fulfilment houses report monthly, while special order shippers report monthly, which results in a delay in matching shipment orders, thereby resulting in a delay in determining which shipments may be from unlicensed entities.

The bill passed the House <u>112-10</u>.

<u>HB 2059</u> – HB 2059, as amended, would amend the Kansas Club and Drinking Establishment Act's provisions related to common consumption areas to remove the requirement that a city or county require that the portions of common consumption areas on public streets or roadways be blocked from motorized traffic during events.

The bill would also require each common consumption area to be marked by signs that are conspicuously posted, identifying the boundaries of such area and in a size and manner that provides notice to persons entering or leaving the area.

The House Committee on Federal & State Affairs amended the bill to replace proposed language allowing the use of appropriate signage for marking a common consumption area with language specifying common consumption area signage be in a size and manner that provides notice to patrons of the boundaries.

During the House Committee hearing, <u>Representative Tory Marie Blew</u> (R-Great Bend) and representatives of the City of Topeka, Kansas League of Municipalities, Kansas Restaurant and Hospitality Association, and the NOTO Arts and Entertainment District provided proponent testimony stating the bill would help cities designate larger and more open areas for events with common consumption area permits and to attract additional patrons. Neutral testimony was provided by a representative of the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control, Kansas Department of Revenue, who stated the agency has some public safety concerns and would prefer additional language be added concerning liability.

The bill passed the House <u>116-6</u>.

 <u>HB 2170</u> – HB 2170, as amended, would amend the Kansas Liquor Control Act provisions on the licensing of spirits, wine, and cereal malt beverage (CMB) distributors concerning samples of products provided to retailers and to club and drinking establishment licensees.

The bill would allow a sample of up to three liters of distilled spirits, three liters of any brand of wine or three gallons of any brand of beer or CMB to be provided to club and drinking establishment licensees and employees of the establishment.

Continuing law allows samples of all types of alcohol to be provided to distributors, retailers, and their employees.

In the hearing, proponent testimony was provided by representatives of the Kansas Association of Beverage Retailers, Kansas Beer Wholesalers Association, and Kansas Wine & Spirits Wholesalers Association. The proponents indicated the bill would conform Kansas law to Federal Tax and Trade Bureau rules in regards to sampling among industry members. One of the proponents recommended an amendment to the bill, requesting the bill become effective upon

publication in the Kansas Register. Neutral testimony was provided by a representative of the Department of Revenue, Alcoholic Beverage Control Division (ABC), who stated that if the bill is passed into law, ABC would begin the process of revoking the portion of the regulation that conflicts with the new law.

The bill passed the House <u>115-7</u>.

 <u>HB 2124</u> – HB 2124 would amend the Kansas Cereal Malt Beverage Act's provisions concerning on-premises sales of cereal malt beverage (CMB) on Sunday to remove the 30 percent food sales requirement for Sunday sales. In continuing law, Sunday sales must have been authorized by the county or city where the licensee is located. Additionally, there is no food sales requirement for other days of the week. The bill would also make technical changes to ensure consistency in statutory phrasing.

In the House Committee hearing, Representative Blew and a representative of the Kansas Beer Wholesalers Association provided proponent testimony, stating the bill would help businesses with only a CMB license to sell such products by-the-drink on Sundays in counties with a food sales requirement.

The bill passed the House <u>97-25</u>.

In addition to those bills mentioned above, <u>HB 253</u> is slated to be heard in the <u>Senate Federal & State</u> <u>Affairs Committee</u> next Friday. The bill would allow for the delivery of liquor and cereal malt beverages from licensed retailers, clubs, drinking establishments, restaurants, and third-party delivery services. The bill was requested for introduction by representatives from Wal-Mart.

LEGISLATION AIMED AT REGULATING THE HOMELESS HEARD

The newly formed <u>House Committee on Welfare Reform</u> heard a <u>bill</u> on Thursday that would clamp down on homeless people gathering or sleeping on public property. The proposal, dubbed the Safe Cities Act, would make it unlawful to use state or local government-owned lands for unauthorized sleeping, camping or long-term shelters, unless it is authorized by law or municipal ordinance. Violations would be an unclassified nonperson misdemeanor with a fine not to exceed \$1, and any second or subsequent violation would be a class C nonperson misdemeanor. Local units of government that do not comply with the law could be subject to civil action by the Attorney General. The hearing garnered tremendous attention in the Capitol. No word yet on whether the bill will be worked.

CHILD ADVOCATE BILLS CONTINUE TO BE DRAFTED & DISCUSSED

A bill establishing the Office of the Child Advocate will be heard on Monday in the <u>Committee on Child</u> <u>Welfare and Foster Care</u>. The proposed legislation, sponsored by Chair <u>Susan Concannon</u> (R-Beloit), is one of several proposals dealing with the same issue. Last week, the Senate passed a <u>bill</u> that would also establish the Office of the Child Advocate and would make it an independent state agency. These various ideas continue to make progress in the legislative process, despite Governor Laura Kelly's <u>Executive Order</u>, signed in October of 2021, that established the <u>Division of the Child Advocate</u> within the Office of Public Advocates. Generally, all proposals have called for a created position that allows for complaints made on behalf of children in the child welfare system to be made to these offices and acted upon accordingly.
