KU CANCER CENTER FUNDING MOVES FORWARD

Money for the University of Kansas and its <u>proposed \$600 million Cancer Center</u> moved through the Legislature this week.

The House and Senate budget committees both recommended \$75 million from the state be allocated to the project. Other proposed funding sources include federal dollars and philanthropic gifts.

The current Cancer Center, which the medical center has outgrown, has had an estimated \$2.5 billion in economic impact from 2007 to 2022. Construction of the new center will also help the University of Kansas Medical Center maintain its prestigious National Cancer Institute designation.

Budgets in both the House and Senate have been finalized and are expected to run in their respective chambers next week.

HOMELESSNESS BILL HEARD; DISCUSSIONS CONTINUE

A bill to help communities deal with homelessness had a hearing this week.

The House Welfare Reform Committee heard <u>HB 2723</u>. The bill would create a grant fund that would be administered by Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS). KDADS would award the funds to Kansas local governments that meet the specified requirements and would be used to create homeless shelter infrastructure and a program to administer the funding and contracts. Awards would need to be matched by the local government receiving the funding based on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

Proponents of the bill noted this would not only help with the building of shelters, but also administering wraparound services to individuals. KDADS had originally requested the \$40 million appropriation be put directly in its budget, but lawmakers opted to draft a bill instead.

The discussion of the issue is expected to continue into next week and include several presentations by entities that address and deal with the homelessness issue across the state.

DEI BILL IMPACTING HIGHER EDUCATION PASSED OUT OF COMMITTEE

Proposed legislation regarding Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) was discussed this week in a committee that oversees budgets for higher education institutions.

The committee held discussion and eventually passed <u>HB 2460</u>. In essence, the bill would prohibit postsecondary educational institutions from conditioning admission or educational aid to applicants, or employment decisions for faculty, upon their support of, or opposition to, statements regarding diversity, equity, inclusion, patriotism, or related topics.

The bill would also create a cause of action for anyone whose rights were allegedly violated against postsecondary educational institutions and its agent in state or federal court for declaratory relief or injunction. Amendments were made to the bill that would lower the penalty for violation of the law and provisions related to due process.

DEI has been a hotly discussed topic across the country in recent years. More than 30 states have introduced bills banning or limiting DEI initiatives. The Kansas Senate has proposed proviso language related to the topic.

It is unclear whether the House will run the bill across its floor.

NEW "PULL OVER" LAW CONSIDERED

New laws pertaining to when drivers are required to pull over had a hearing in the <u>House Transportation</u> Committee on Thursday.

<u>SB 142</u> would require drivers approaching a stopped vehicle displaying hazard lights or other similar signal to proceed with caution and change lanes if it is possible to do so. If a driver does not comply, a \$75 fine would be issued.

Proponents of the bill included AAA Kansas, the Kansas Chiefs of Police and Sheriff's Association.

The bill originally passed the Senate on a vote of 38-2.

STAR BOND REFORM BILL FIRST INTRODUCED IN 2023 TO BE HEARD

A bill pertaining to STAR bond reform will be heard next week in the Senate Commerce Committee.

The proposal, which was passed in the House last year, would provide for state revenue to replace lost sales tax proceeds attributable to reductions in the state sales tax rate on food, expand eligible uses of STAR bonds to historic theaters and major amusement parks, extend the deadline for the submission of the annual STAR bonds report, and increase the amount of project costs that may be financed in certain rural redevelopment projects without the issuance of special obligation bonds.

STAR - or Sales Tax and Revenue - bonds have been used in Kansas the past several years. It is a financing tool that allows Kansas municipalities to issue bonds to finance the development of major commercial, entertainment and tourism projects. The bonds are paid off through the sales tax revenue generated by the development. The intent is to increase regional and national visitation to Kansas.

Results have been mixed. Some districts have had tremendous growth and have become major tourist destinations. Others continue to struggle and have left the state and local units without tax revenue.

The bill will be heard next Tuesday.

AG PROPOSES BILL TO HELP COMBAT RETAIL CRIME

With retail crime spiking across the country, <u>Attorney General Kris Kobach</u> is bringing forward a bill that would create a new crime to help clamp down on criminals. <u>SB 415</u> would create new a crime of organized retail crime, which would be a severity level 5, nonperson felony.

Under the bill, theft of property that has a value of \$3,000 or more would be a severity level 5, nonperson felony. The bill would also add organized retail crime to offenses under the Kansas Racketeering Act. The Attorney General and county or district attorney could concurrently prosecute violations of the Kansas Racketeering Act and crimes that are part of an alleged course of criminal conduct that occurred in two or more counties.

The bill will be heard in the <u>Senate Judiciary Committee</u> on Tuesday.
